Success in our musician search!

The Search Committee, the Mutual Ministry Committee and the Congregation Council are pleased to announce the selection of Jungwha Kim as Parish musician for St. Mark's. She will begin her duties here on May 2, 2011, after she concludes her work in Freeport in western Pennsylvania.

She comes to us with experience and excellent training. She began her professional study with a Bachelor of Music degree from Yonsei University in her native South Korea. She also holds a Sacred Music Diploma from the Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY, and a Master of Music in Organ Performance and Literature, also from the Eastman School, and an additional Professional Studies certificate from the Juilliard School in NYC. She has also participated in Organ academies in Goteborg, Sweden; Montreal, Quebec; and Calgary, Alberta. She has presented recitals both in New York and in Pennsylvania.

Jungwha has experience in a variety of situations, most recently as organist/choirmaster in Freeport United Methodist Church and Park Presbyterian Church in Beaver. She has also served in Episcopal, Roman Catholic and Baptist churches when she was engaged in professional studies. She is proud of works that she has composed for hand-bells, for organ, and also for choir.

She served as guest organist at St. Mark's on Epiphany Eve, Wednesday, January 5, and returned as guest organist on the Festival of the Transfiguration, Sunday, March 3. She adroitly handled the intricacies of Evening Prayer and the Holy Communion liturgy, and she was pleased to work briefly with our choir and greet many members of the parish.



Negotiations have been completed, and she has accepted the congregation's offer of employment. Housing arrangements are also underway now, and moving is planned for shortly after Easter. Jungwha has chosen to use the office first occupied by Mr. Snell when the building was new. This room at the end of the choir hall will be painted and prepared next month in preparation for her arrival.

It is an important thing for a faithful Lutheran congregation to have competent musical leadership. we look forward to Jungwha stepping into the long tradition of excellence at St. Mark's.



Our special thanks is due to Donna Zierdt Elkin, who has so capably served as musician for seven months while the search was continuing. Working under severe time constraints, she has kept the rehearsal schedule for the ensembles, and even expanded things by leading our string students in playing at Christmastime. She has begun work on computerizing the catalog of the music library and made good use of the resources at hand. All this and more has been done with unfailing good humor and attention to detail that helps the whole process of worship and music to move ahead, to the glory of God.

Seeing our Nation's Capitol Through the Eyes of a Servant

After all the fundraisers and preparation, we finally left for our mission trip to Washington D.C. thinking we would prepare meals in soup kitchens and sort food at the Food Bank. However, God had other plans for us. What we did in two days took us out of our comfort zone, challenged us and in the end, made us smile, because we knew it was all worth it, and in some small way, we helped to make things happen.

We got started on Sunday night right after we arrived. Our coordinators took us on a prayer tour of the city. We stopped at "The Children of Mine Youth Center," where we prayed for Mrs. Hannah Hawkins and her work with the inner city youth who came to the center. We drove through the affluent Adams Morgan community where black and white came together, lived in unity and where diversity was celebrated. We prayed in the impoverished community of Anacostia where housing projects were being renovated. You would think that would be a good thing, but the renovations raised the prices so much that the residents could not afford to live there anymore. At the end of our prayer tour, we drove up to an overlook where we could see the entire city. Even in the pouring rain, we not only saw our beautiful nation's capital, we also saw a city of hope, where people cared enough to want to make a difference.

On Monday, we went to "A Wider Circle." This organization gives furniture and small household appliances away to those who need it. This program was started by a man who was delivering a meal to a family. When he walked in their apartment, there was no couch, no beds, and no table to eat their meal he had delivered. He decided to do something about it and "A Wider Circle was born." We thoroughly cleaned the furniture in the showroom. What struck me the most was that these people were on a waiting list for months. After waiting so long, the day the staff helped them choose their furniture, and we helped them load it onto trucks was truly a happy day for them. It brought me joy to know that I had a small part in helping them with their furniture, when the day before, they were sleeping on the floor. Later that afternoon, we worked with elementary school students at an afterschool program located in an apartment building. Meneta Wyatt, the director there, truly had a heart for these kids. She treated them as her own. For three hours we helped the students with homework and played with them in the small, grassy area outside the apartment complex. The kids' smiles were contagious and they really enjoyed having our undivided attention. Meneta was grateful for our help and playing with the kids made the afternoon so worthwhile.

On Tuesday, we worked with an organization called "Community Group Homes" and raked and cleaned an elderly woman's yard. Under all the leaves and branches we cleared were the first signs we had seen of spring. There were flowers blooming everywhere. By the time we finished, her yard looked terrific and spring had definitely arrived.

Our biggest challenge came on Tuesday afternoon when we did an activity called the "Urban Plunge." There were four of us in a group. We were given \$2.00 per person and bus tickets with enough money on it to get us to and from our destination. We had to feed our group and a homeless person with the \$8.00 we had. We also had to have enough money left over to buy a pair of socks to give to someone. Once we were there, we had to talk with the homeless to find out many things; where to find a cheap meal, where to sleep if we had to spend a night in the city, and where we could go if we were sick and didn't have any insurance. I was amazed at how friendly and helpful the homeless were to us. We got our meal at CVS. We were able to buy four cans of spaghetti and meatballs and the socks. We ate our dinner right out of the can at the park and I couldn't help but notice the looks that our group received from passersby. It was a very humbling experience and it made me realize how difficult it would be to even spend one night on the streets.

It seemed very fitting to end our Washington experience by attending the Ash Wednesday service at the National Cathedral. In the midst of the beauty of the cathedral, the ashes on our foreheads were a solemn reminder that we are dust and to dust we shall return. Everything we have is because God chooses to provide for us, and it is our obligation to keep our hearts and minds fixed on his kingdom and serve those in need.

2011 Synod Assembly Registration Begins

The 2011 Upper Susquehanna Synod Assembly will take place at Susquehanna University in Selinsgrove on Friday, June 17, and Saturday, June 18, 2011 with the theme "The Church Must Be Planted." Registration materials are being mailed to congregations in early March. Congregations elect their voting members to the assembly in the process designated by their congregational constitutions. Early registrations (received by April 15) receive a discount of \$10 off the registration fee. This year's assembly will gather an "in-kind" offering of health kits for Lutheran World Relief. Congregations are encouraged to collect kits together, sending a box full (or more!) with their voting members on the first day of the assembly. Project information:

"Two Point of Woods (Manassas) neighborhoods will be the focal point of our project.

The two neighborhoods include 440 townhomes built in the 1970s and '80s. Many were severely affected by the mortgage/foreclosure crisis. Overcrowding, property deterioration, broken fences, graffiti, tall grass and trash are just some of the stressors discouraged homeowners have endured.

In 2009 a handful of homeowners stepped forward to make a difference. They restored the entrance walls to the neighborhood, abated graffiti, installed some motion-detector lighting in alleys and started a small neighborhood watch. By hosting community events like yard sales, cleanups and fall festivals, they have begun to engage neighbors again.

We need your youthful energy, hard work and spirit to boost to their goal of restoring neighborhood pride.....Point of Woods has a dream...a field of dreams. We would like to honor the memory of Sergeant John D. Conner III, the only police officer to die in the line of duty in the history of Manassas by creating a community garden and memorial gazebo in a 3-acre field. With your help, we will raise that community garden and gathering place from the ground up and dedicate it as the Sgt. John D. Conner Memorial Park."

St. Paul Lutheran Church Scholarship Program

ATTENTION HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS & STUDENTS IN COLLEGE!

The Scholarship Program:

The St. Paul Lutheran Church Scholarship Program was founded by the congregation of the former St. Paul Lutheran Church in Williamsport, Pennsylvania. St. Paul Lutheran Church, prior to its closing, established this special scholarship program to benefit Lutheran students in Lycoming County, Pennsylvania, in perpetuity.

Eligibility

Eligible candidates will be graduating seniors of a high school, or a high school graduate equivalent, located in Lycoming County, Pennsylvania. Candidates must be members of a Lutheran church, and eligible candidates also include those individuals who were members of St. Paul Lutheran Church in Williamsport, Pennsylvania, at the time of its closing. Candidates must be attending, or plan to attend in the 2010-2011 academic year, an institution of higher education (academic, technical, or vocational). Eligible candidates must also have a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale and demonstrate involvement in church and community. Candidates may reapply in successive years for scholarships available from this program.

Scholarship Awards

Scholarships awarded in 2011 will be available only for the 2011-2012 academic year. Scholarship awards may be used only for educational expenses, including tuition, books, laboratory expenses, or other education-related expenditures that are approved by the Foundation.

Selection of Recipients

The number of scholarships awarded, the amount of the scholarship awards, and the selection of scholarship recipients will be determined by the Foundation.

Application Process and Deadline

Students who wish to apply to the scholarship program must complete an application and required letters of recommendation and submit materials postmarked no later than **April 15, 2011**. The application and required attachments will be available in the staff hallway or online at http://www.thelcf.org/grants/ scholarship_applications.

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Meandering through Museums and More!

On Saturday, March 5, five catechetical students (with adults in tow) ventured hence to Philadelphia, PA. While there, they visited Gloria Dei Church, Penn's Landing and the University of Pennsylvania Museum. Here's what engaged them:

On the confirmation trip, we stopped at the Gloria Dei Church. "Gloria Dei" translates in "Glory of God." The site is more commonly known as Old Swedes Church. The church is the oldest in Pennsylvania. It was built between 1698 and 1700. It started as a Lutheran church for its first 150 years, then became and Episcopal church in 1845 because of its "unique historical significance." Betsy Ross got married in this church. HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

If you find great enjoyment in food (I've met few who don't fit this description), take some time to read the eleventh chapter of the book of Leviticus. The writer goes into great detail regarding the purity and impurity of a variety of foods. More than just quaint legalism, some of these Hebrew "laws" probably saved more than a few lives. Today we have modern methods of food preservation, preparation, and storage. In addition, we've all been schooled in the importance of hand washing and proper clean-up when working with fresh foods.

According to the Food and Drug administration, an estimated **76 million cases** of food-borne illness occur annually, resulting in **325,000 hospitalizations** and **5,000 deaths** - meaning that roughly 13 men, women and children die every day because of food-borne illness. This is an estimate, because many cases of gastrointestinal illness are treated at home, without being seen by a doctor.

"If you have used your kitchen sponge longer than two or three days ... it is swimming with millions of bacteria, more specifically, E. coli, salmonella, or campylobacter ... that means that any time you use the sponge to wipe up a surface you are potentially spreading those pathogens."
 (Elizabeth Scott, co-director of the Simmons Center for Hygiene and Health in the Home, Simmons College, Boston)

UGH!! Dr. Charles Gerba, a microbiologist at the University of Arizona states that a home's highest levels of contamination are found in areas which remain damp: the kitchen sponge or dishcloth, kitchen and bath sink drains, and the kitchen faucet handle.

What to do?

- Wash your hands in hot, soapy water for at least 20 seconds before food prep and wash them again after touching raw foods (including vegetables).
- Kill bacteria from your sponge by microwaving the damp sponge on high for one minute – every day. Do not microwave a dry sponge – it might catch fire!
- Launder (in bleach) or microwave dishcloths regularly (while damp also!).
- Even plastic cutting boards are not 100% safe. 90% of bacteria will die in the dishwasher, but play it safe, wash the board in hot soapy water (or dishwasher) and in addition, rinse them with a solution of 1 teaspoon chlorine bleach in one quart of water.
- Your kitchen sink drain, disposal and connecting pipe are often overlooked. They should be sanitized periodically by pouring down the sink, a solution of 1 teaspoon of chlorine bleach in 1 quart of water.
- Make sure the water in your dishwasher is hotter than 140 degrees or bacteria will survive. Water lower than that temperature may actually spread bacterial contamination to other items in the dishwasher.

So the cleanest of kitchens, might turn out to be the dirtiest – especially if you wipe the counters often – you might be spreading bacteria in the process. In a University of Arizona study, the "cleanest kitchens were those of bachelors who never wiped up and just put the dirty dishes in the sink – go figure!"
