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#### **Council Notes**

The Council does not meet in regular session in July, its next regular session will be August 15.

The Council has endorsed the decision of the Mutual Ministry Committee's Hiring Sub-Committee to employ Mr. Graydon Yearick to replace Mr. Richard Wagner, who submitted his retirement resignation this month. The Staff of the congregation honored Mr. Wagner at a luncheon on July 18 and expressed its appreciation for his partnership in our work together in St. Mark's.

Mr. Yearick was the committee's choice out of 16 applicants who answered our call for candidates. For more than 20 years he developed a data processing facility for 15 community banks in central Pennsylvania, and before that was Vice-President for Operations at Williamsport National Bank for 16 years. He began his career as a Senior Programming Analyst at the IRS in Washington. With this extensive background, the committee thinks that he will have little trouble handling our bookkeeping duties.

There are several interesting circumstances. It happens that Mr. Wagner and Mr. Yearick are both members of the United Methodist congregation in Oval. In the interview process, we discovered that Mr. Yearick is the brother of our long-time member Connie Shaible.

Mr. Yearick will be in the office on August 1 to begin the transition with Mr. Wagner. We anticipate that when a person calls with a question or comment, they will be greeted by a man of friendly competence, just as we have had with Mr. Wagner.

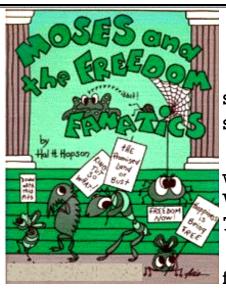

## Make up a kit for someone who is suffering!

Did you get a bag to fill for a School Kit? You may prefer to make up one of the other kits that Lutheran World Relief distributes. Please note that the guidelines have changed for three of the kits. Soap bars are also again being collected.

**PERSONAL CARE KITS** (formerly Health Kits) – People who must leave their homes suddenly will want to wash away the dirt and sweat. Wrap the following items in the towel and tie securely.





- 1 bath-size towel (approx 52" x 27"), dark color recommended
- 2 bath-size (4 to 5 oz.) of soap, any brand, in original wrapping
- 1 adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging
- 1 sturdy comb, remove packaging
- 1 metal nail clippers, remove packaging

**BABY CARE HITS** (formerly Layettes) – To a mother living in poverty, the following items can give warmth and comfort, and soap to keep the germs away from her precious baby. Gently used, clean items (no stains or tears) can be substituted for new ones. Varying the sizes of clothing will help as the baby grows. Wrap all the items in one blanket and secure with pins.

- 2 lightweight cotton t-shirts
- 2 long or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers without feet
- 2 receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel
- 4 cloth diapers, flat fold preferred
- 1 jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, or include a baby cap (Size up to 24 months).
- 2 pairs of socks
- 1 hand towel, dark color recommended
- 2 bath-size bars (4 to 5 oz.) of gentle soap, in original wrapping
- 2 diaper pins or large safety pins





**FABRIC HITS** (formerly Sewing Kits) – Sewing is a valuable skill that can lead to an income for men or women. Fold the thread and one piece of fabric inside the other piece and tie with yarn, ribbon, or strip of fabric. (No knits, 100% polyester)

- 2 pieces of cotton or cotton-blend fabric cut into pieces measuring
- 3 yds. of 44" wide fabric or 4 yds. of 36" wide fabric

## From the Pastor's Pen...



There is lots to see and experience on the Amazing Grace tour on August 6.

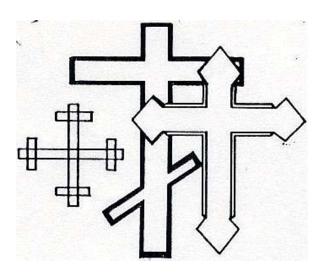
Have you ever thought about how the church building affects the shape and content of our worship services? Here at St. Mark's our Nave is a formal space with straight orderly rows of pews leading to a focus on the cross and the altar, the place from which the Holy Communion is celebrated. The Chapel is often arranged with its seats facing each other to facilitate the singing of the Psalms back and forth. It is a much more intimate space for the gathering of the people of God. In the Nave, the majesty of God is foremost; in the Chapel there might be more of a sense of God's immanence, his being close at hand.

Do color and light influence our worship? We have the stunning series of stained glass windows in our Nave that remind us on the south side about the parts of the worship service and that we are fitting into something that has been going on for a very long time, and on the north side reminding us of all of the things that we do in every aspect of our lives because of that connection with the Lord Jesus in worship. The chapel has, in addition to the series of panes depicting the life of Christ, lots of

clear glass, so that the room is flooded with natural night to remind us of the glories of creation in every season of the year.

These are a few of the things that visitors to our building may discover on the Amazing Grace tour. What might we find out in the other church buildings on the tour? What is good or not so good about a fan-shaped arrangement of the seating at St. Boniface? How might it help or hinder our proper focus in worship? We have one icon in front of us each week. What would it be like to have dozens of them everywhere one looks in Holy Cross Church? Does one get the feeling of being surrounded by the saints? The Salvation Army is not just a social-service agency, but also a worshiping community. What is attractive about their special exuberance in their relatively small space?

There are lots more observations and surprises to be discovered. Take some time to participate, see and experience hospitality from our brothers and sisters in Christ, and return with renewed appreciation for our own facilities, too.

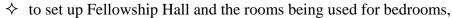

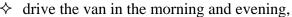

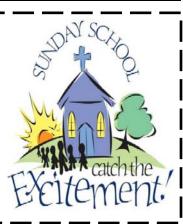

## Notes from Declan to "The People of St. Mark's"



05 July 2011 7:57 PM Hey All!

I got your notes, thank you very much.

Doing well with my training. I just got over a fever and fighting off a cough. I am actually working on two different tans lines: the modified farmers' tan, knees down and mid-bicep down, and what I call the "soldiers' tan." It gets hot enough down here that we put our uniforms into what we call "HeatCat 5:" we roll up our sleeves and pants. So, the soldiers' tan is mid-forearm down.

## HEALTH, HEALING & WHOLENESS

The summer months are flying by, and at one point or another, we will all experience seasonal overload. You know what I mean – you have to go to aunt Suzie's picnic, attend all the kids' ball games, take the kids to the pool, tend those gardens, can/freeze that fresh produce – the list could go on forever! Whatever happened to sitting on the front porch with a glass of iced tea or lemonade, watching the paint dry, or the grass grow? Before we know it, we've become "human doings" instead of human beings, and our stress level has reached the point of making our fun activities feel more like chores.

Typically stress develops when the demands of your life exceed your ability to cope with them. Like our fingerprints, stress is unique to each and every one of us. Research in the field of Neuro-Theology has demonstrated that people who meditate or pray, actually change their brain chemistry in a way that promotes better health and well-being – not surprising if we remember that God has promised to be near us, **especially** when we pray. Other benefits of an active prayer life include relaxation, increased ability to focus, and a sense of peace. Most of us know God's Ten Commandments; I would like to offer up another Ten Commandments – of managing stress:

- 1. Thou shalt organize thyself. Take better control of the way you are spending your time and energy so you can handle stress more effectively.
- 2. Thou shalt control thy environment by controlling who and what is surrounding you. In this way, you can either get rid of stress or get support for yourself.
- 3. Thou shalt love thyself by giving yourself positive feedback. Remember, you are a unique individual who is doing the best you can.
- 4. Thou shalt reward thyself by planning leisure activities into your life. It really helps to have something to look forward to.
- 5. Thou shalt relax thyself by taking your mind off your stress and concentrating on breathing and positive thoughts. Dreaming counts, along with meditation, prayer, listening to relaxing music, communicating with friends and loved ones, etc.
- 6. Thou shalt rest thyself as regularly as possible. Sleep for 7-8 hours a night. Take breaks. There is only so much your mind can absorb at one time. It needs time to process and integrate information. A general rule-of-thumb take a ten-minute break every two hours. Rest your eyes, as well as your mind.
- 7. Thou shalt be aware of thyself. Be aware of distress signals such as insomnia, headaches, anxiety, upset stomach, lack of concentration, cold/flu, excessive tiredness, etc. Remember, these can be signs of potentially more serious disorders (i.e. ulcers, hypertension, heart disease).
- 8. Thou shalt feed thyself/thou shalt not poison thy body. Eat a balanced diet. Avoid high calorie foods that are high in fats and sugars. Don't depend on drugs and/or alcohol. Caffeine will keep you awake, but it also makes it harder for some to concentrate. A ten-minute walk has been proven to be a better tranquilizer than some prescription drugs.
- 9. *Enjoy thyself!* It has been show that happier people tend to live longer, have fewer physical problems, and are more productive. Look for humor in life when things don't make sense. Remember, you are very special and deserve only the best treatment from yourself.
- 10. Thou shalt pray the serenity prayer and mean it! "God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can, and the wisdom to know the difference."

Your body's flight-or-fight reaction has strong biological roots. It's there for self-preservation. But if stress is getting the better of you and you fear its long-term effects, don't be afraid or ashamed to seek help in breaking through old stress behavior patterns. Your physical health may depend on it!
