### Proposed Budget for 2012

Below is a condensed version of the 2012 spending plan for the congregation. Some explanatory notes that may be helpful in understanding what is presented here:

he substantial excess of expenses over income for 2011 has been funded for most of the year by significant contributions received in December of 2010. Additionally we had the benefit of a release of interest from a prior year from the Welker trust that was delayed due to a tax issue.

Envelopes and pledges for 2011 were forecast to be 2% lower than 2010 levels. The finance committee believes that trend will continue for 2012.

Salaries and benefits for 2011 are below what we have budgeted for 2012 because during 2011 the musician position was vacant until May.


### Passing on Faith: First Communion & Third Grade Bible

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

# A note from Jungwha

# Thanks to all of you!



It is a great time to thank people I love and work for; Senior Choir, Adult Choir, Family Handbell Choir, musicians who sang and played for our summer worship, youth choir, of course, our musical father (?) Pastor Elkin.

I remember my early days in Juilliard School having my first church job as an organist of one of Baptist churches in New Jersey while I was in school (back then I commuted from New Jersey to New York.) One day while I was playing a fast piece insanely fast, my teacher asked me why I played so fast, al-though it is supposed to be fast. Nevertheless, it sounded like I was chased by something. So I told him I was chased by time, since I have to divide my time well for school work and church work, both of them were too big to fill in. I practiced insanely seven hours a day and two hours for score-reading for the keyboard harmony class. I snored aloud when I slept. I even heard it. A week feels like forever. Those are the memorable hectic school days. It is still vivid in my head.

I had another '*being chased*' experience when I joined the Mendelssohn Choir of Pittsburgh. However, this time I was in the profession already. I cannot overlook any field of the profession. It is not about how much I practice any more. I am planning way ahead to be ready. I struggle to survive with whatever happens in my schedule looking back to my previous teacher at Eastman School of Music in Rochester, NY, who has two jobs; one in America, another in Sweden. Every time school has recess, he is in another continent of the world. One thing I regret not learning from him is time management. How does he do that? He must have 48 hours a day like our shepherd, Pastor Elkin...

I remember the time I spent as a Mendelssohn Choir member with the Maestro, Rafael Frühbeck, a guest conductor from Spain.

I always wanted to learn conducting techniques not from choral conductors but from orchestral conductors. In my opinion, they have more tangible skills than choirmasters, because instrumentalists have the music written only their parts with multi-rest bars. Therefore they completely rely on the cues out of Maestros who have the full score as opposed to choral music, which has other singers' parts to see while they are not supposed to sing. That maestro I met in rehearsal process communicates with musicians throwing his whole body as a tool of expressive device in addition to the facial expression, of course. His eyes roll all over places and his neck turns 360 degrees while his remaining body does something else.... Awesome! In a second, he gets everyone's attention. What a charisma and tech-



nique! I should learn from him because he is not eloquent in English like me, but he knows nuts and bolts and all whistles of music making. Language is not his tool, but he goes all over the world to dictate professional musicians.

Now I realize how hard my profession is and how hard people to follow me, because I play all the time while I work with the chancel choir fixing my eyes, feet, hands, neck on the music to provide the accompaniment parts simultaneously. As a singer of the group, I relieved as the Maestro made mistakes saying myself nobody is perfect, ha! The ringers can be compared as the string players in orchestra. They are not making the direct eye contact to see the conductor, but they observe his gesture sometimes through the shadow, the bottom of the conducting pattern (ictus), tip of the baton, or from the left hand because of their location just like the ringers who have to see the table to change the bells, damp on the table, etc.



Everyone in music ministries does their best to lead and share their musical portion for St. Mark's Church. It is matter of how I deal with the situation while I carry two persons' job in me. The Maestro I sang with is not even one of the most famous conductors in the world. Ouch!

Wait for me, I am still growing to be a better musician. Thank you, all!

The annual Campus Ministry meeting was recently held at Shippensburg University. The main topic of conversation was the decreasing funding available for our campus ministry programs. ## Health, Healing & Wholeness

"Then Peter came and said to him, 'Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?'

Jesus said to him, 'Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times.'" (Matthew 18:21-22; NRSV)

Forgive ... such a small word, yet so hard to comprehend and to put into practice! Though it is changing, there is still relatively little research on the direct connection between forgiving and health – no direct evidence that proves once-and-for-all that holding a grudge leads to long-term health problems. There is however, a great deal of scientific evidence that **does** exist on the health affects of depression, anxiety, and anger – by-products of the hurt and betrayal felt when someone has wronged us – increased blood pressure, increase in heart rate, the release of hormones that trigger out fight-or-flight reactions, head-ache, stomach problems, sleeplessness – all occurring whenever we allow the painful episode to rewind and replay over and over in our minds.

We compound these effects whenever we allow the 'things we wish we'd said' to roll across our tongues as we smack our lips at the thought of retribution. The result is that we begin to stew in our own juices, and the one who actually gets hurt is us. Rev. Dr. Lewis Smedes once said, "To forgive is to set a prisoner free, and to discover the prisoner was you." Forgiveness, as well as its opposites, resentment and revenge, all begin the same way – *with a decision*.

Lest we confuse the two, let's begin by saying that forgiveness **does not** mean forgetting! It does not sanction or justify the actions of the one who has deeply wounded us, and does not release the other person from responsibility - or in some cases, even legal punishment. Those who forgive are not fools – it doesn't mean that the relationship can, or even should, go back to the same as prior to the incident. Instead, forgiveness empowers **us** to take responsibility for our own future happiness. The process may not be easy, and likely will not adhere to a set time-table - we may even find we need to work and re-work our way through it. In some cases, forgiving can be extremely difficult, so it may be wise to find someone trained to assist in the process – someone we trust, such as our pastor or a therapist.



The important point is that we don't have to wait for the other party to say they are sorry – we could have a rather long wait - one that leaves *us* stuck with the pain. Instead, with God's grace, working through the process of forgiving empowers us to become the ones who determine when the healing begins; that typically means allowing ourselves to feel the full impact of the pain incurred. Trying to forget and push the resulting emotions out of our awareness, only leads to repressed feelings that can later manifest themselves in other emotional or physical ways (for example, chronic headaches, depression, ulcers or in some extremes, substance abuse).

The bottom line is this; recognizing the fact that we can forgive the person without forgiving his/her actions, takes away that individual's power over us, and in the process allows us to no longer be held captive to the role of being a victim. Through prayer, scripture, and openness to the Spirit, God reminds us that He has come to us - to journey with us to healing and release from the pain that has made us captive. Consider forgiveness to be the gift that you give yourself this Christmas. Take that first step. Emmanuel has come to accompany you on your journey toward wholeness in body, mind and spirit.


