Jane Zimmerer and Becky Miller Pryor wish to thank the many volunteers who set-up Fellowship Hall and the bedrooms on twenty-four hours notice, prepared meals, washed dishes, baked wonderful cakes and cookies, chatted with the adults, drove the van in the morning and evening, slept over, cooked breakfast on the weekend, donated groceries and money, cleaned up at the conclusion of the week and did laundry for the next hosting week. It is important to know that it does not matter if we have two guests or a full house we still need all of our volunteers to cover the duties of hosting.

We do not charge for any of it, but we do ask for contributions in support of St. Anthony's Center. This year we are able to send Sister Henry \$295.51!


Hospitality Coordinator at 10:30 – This person manages the list of persons who provide the refreshments following the 10:30 service and encourages the conversations to continue.

From the Pastor

It has happened several times recently that events that have been planned and announced months in advance have had to be canceled because of lack of registrants. The latest casualty is our summer music camp, but it seems that every aspect of our common life is suffering: worship, education, music, service projects, outreach, property care, financial stewardship, and fellowship events.

I need to tell you about Larue Dieter. Due to her physical problems, she ventures from her apartment building at Wood's Edge only rarely, but she is intimately involved in the ministry of St. Mark's congregation. She uses her listening skills from Stephen Ministry as she talks with other residents. She makes many phone calls on behalf of our Family Promise hosting weeks, she helps to prepare items for the July 4th event, she manages the prayer chain...and the list goes on. As I was talking with her a few days ago, I realized that I needed to write this paragraph so that others can know the range and significance of things that can be done even by one of mature years. In our conversation, Larue referred to the long list of those who apparently do nothing at all in the ministry of the congregation. "Why would they want to die before they are dead?", she said Why, indeed?

Some are saying that it is the national mood these days, that everyone is me-centered and anxious. We cannot let those things be the driving force in our life in Christ. There will always be crooked politicians, There will always be wars and rumors of wars. There will always be worries about jobs and money and retirements and children and spouses and all the rest. The center-point of our life is the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ and the promise that he makes to each of us in Holy Baptism to hold onto us forever, to graft us as branches to a vine so that we may bear fruit now and always. That is what enlivens us and keeps us going; that is what gives us a goal. Let's keep our mind and our focus there! That gives us the best reason for coming together, for doing so many different things, things that matter, things that honor the Lord Jesus, and accomplish what he wants to be done.

CROP WALK 2012



According to records, this year will be UCLC's 33rd walk. During the past 32 years the Greater Williamsport Walk has collected \$731,090.79. The Trout Run Walk has collected \$42,471.82 since their beginning. And through Lycoming County, in Williamsport - Trout Run - Jersey Shore - Hughesville - Muncy - Montgomery we have raised \$1,002,087.28 to help CROP stop hunger!

Thank you for doing your part in fighting hunger both locally and globally. 25% of the money we collect comes back to our community and is distributed equally to the American Rescue Workers Food Pantry, the Sonlight House of Muncy, the United Churches Food Pantry and St. Anthony's Center. The other 75% is distributed by Church World Service nationally and internationally to help people who are hungry. We have taken a local allocation for the past 15 years, which has brought a total of \$57,490.80 back into our community. Other walks in our county have added to this total! Together, we can make a difference!

You can purchase the items over the summer and place the completed kits in the box in the Narthex. In addition, soap is also being collected.



NEW GUIDELINES FOR ALL KITS

Do not enclose Kits or any of its contents in plastic bags.



Fabric Kit

2 pieces of cotton or cotton-blend fabric (no knits or 100% polyester). Each piece should match one of the sizes below:

- ∘2¼ yards of 60" wide fabric, or
- ∘3 yards of 44" wide fabric, or
- ∘4 yards of 36" wide fabric

2 spools of neutral-colored all purpose thread, 250-300 yards

Fabric should have no stains or holes. Pieces do not need to match in size or color/pattern. Fold thread and one piece of fabric inside second fabric piece and tie with yarn, sturdy string, ribbon or a strip of fabric.

School Kit

- 4 70-sheet notebooks of wide- or college-ruled paper approximately 8" X 10½"; no loose-leaf paper
- 1 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters and inches
- 1 pencil sharpener
- 1 blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- 5 unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band
- 5 black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink); secure together with a rubber band
- 1 box of 16 or 24 crayons
- 1 21/2" eraser

1 sturdy drawstring backpack-style cloth bag approximately 14" X 17" with shoulder straps (no standard backpacks)

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new & in good condition. Remove any excess packaging, pack all items in bag and close.

Personal Care Kit

- 1 light-weight bath-size towel (max. 52" X 27"), dark color
- 2 bath-size bars (4 to 5 oz.) of soap, any brand, wrapped
- 1 adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging or sealed in a business-size envelope
- 1 sturdy comb, remove packaging
- 1 metal nail clippers remove packaging

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new and in good condition. Wrap all the items in the towel and tie securely with ribbons or yarn.

Layette Kit


- 2 lightweight cotton t-shirts
- 2 long- or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers (without feet)
- 2 receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn, up to 52" square
- 4 cloth diapers, flat fold preferred
- 1 jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, or include a baby cap
- 2 pairs of socks
- 1 hand towel, dark color wrapped
- 2 diaper pins or large safety pins

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. Gently used, clean items (no stains or tears) or new. Wrap items in one of the receiving blankets and secure with diaper pins.


Course 3 - Charles Dickens "A Christmas Carol"

"Listen to me, my child, and do not disregard me, and in the end you will appreciate my words. In everything you do be moderate, and no sickness will overtake you." (Sirach/Ecclesiasticus 31:22)

The book of Sirach/Ecclesiasticus is located in the Apocrypha, a group of religious writings which were not received into the canon or Bible. The Apocrypha covers the inter-testamental time - between the end of the Old Testament, and the beginning of the New. Sirach has a style similar to the book of Proverbs, in that its function seems to be intent on imparting wisdom to the reader. This month's quote seems appropriate when we look at an emerging problem of diabetes – both Types 1 & 2 – among our children.

Type 1 diabetes occurs when the immune system attacks the insulin-producing cells in the pancreas, which causes insulin production to drop then stop. Type 2 diabetes is characterized by the body becoming resistant to insulin. The pancreas reacts by trying to work harder to overcome the resistance. This can lead to the organ not being able to produce enough insulin to meet the body's needs. Insulin is required for our cells to take in the glucose/sugar required to function properly.

We've heard a great deal about the rise of diabetes in our country's children. The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia has (CHOP) has provided this month's signs and symptoms of this disease.

(Daily, F. April 2012. Children's Health Tip of the Week: Diabetes in Children: Warning Signs and Symptoms. The Children's Hospital of Philadelphia)

Both Types 1 and 2 can share the following symptoms:

Excessive urination

Excessive thirst

Fatigue (from cells not being able to get the energy they need)

Fungal and bacterial infections which thrive in high-sugar environments

Additional symptoms of Type 1 diabetes include:

Dry mouth

Weight loss despite increased hunger as the child's body begins to burn fat as fuel

Vomiting – when the body burns fat, it gives off toxic acids known as ketones; ketones trigger vomiting Blurred vision – high blood sugar can temporarily alter the shape of the eye, affecting vision.

Children with Type 2 may have milder symptoms. Additional symptoms and risk factors may include:

Acanthosis nigricans – a skin condition causing light brown-to-black velvety textured areas on the skin, typically on the sides and back of the neck, in the underarm and groin areas

Slowed healing of sores and cuts

Family history of diabetes and other risk factors; conditions such as polycystic ovarian syndrome, high blood pressure and high cholesterol are associated with Type 2 diabetes

Being overweight – a child with a BMI (body mass index) over 95% for his/her age is at greater risk for the development of Type 2 diabetes.

If you notice any of these signs and symptoms in your child, contact his/her healthcare provider. Simple testing can rule out diabetes as the cause of his/her symptoms.


