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

What will you offer?

We offer with joy and thanksgiving what you have first given us: October 21, 2012 signs of your precious love.

These, or similar, words are repeated each Sunday after the offering. We may just say them; we may think about what we are saying, or we may earnestly pray in thankfulness to our God for all that He has done for us.

It is time to put those words into our hearts and into action. Consecration Sunday is October 21 this year. We understand the concept that, from a biblical perspective, financial stewardship is not money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, we know that financial contributions are a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes. Since this goes against our natural tendencies to want to regard everything as our own possessions, we must continue to think about this and make it a part of our life a bit at a time. Consecration Sunday is a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving. Again, we are responding with joy and thanksgiving.

Every attendee and member, who completes an Estimate of Giving Card, does so voluntarily while attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday, October 21. We urge everyone to attend, even those who are hesitant to complete a card, because the procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend worship on Consecration Sunday, October 21. In the coming weeks, please think prayerfully about the blessings God has given to you, and about how you are called to share those blessings.

The other part of the event is the celebration meal that follows each worship service on October 21. At services on October 7 and 14 we'll be asking for your reservation for the breakfast following the 8:30 service or the lunch following the 10:30 service on Consecration Sunday. It is important that every member take part.

Our friend Pastor W. Stevens Shipman will again speak to us on how Stewardship (our works and efforts) coincides with what we do after we say "We believe...". Stewardship is, indeed, our faith in action. Let us be thankful for all of our blessings.

This way you can pray at your convenience and without pressure.





See You At The Pole 2012



For this cause I bow my knees unto the Father... I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being so that Christ may dwell in your hearts...And I pray that you... grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and...that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God. Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine...

This theme passage of Paul's prayer for his friends in Ephesus is one of the most famous prayers in the Bible. He desires so deeply for them to be able to grasp the extravagant dimensions of Christ's love (msg)! He yearns for his friends to awaken in a fresh way to the endless possibilities of what only God can do! He is passionate in his cry for awakening in their inner beings like they've never experienced.

Pray for an unusual outpouring of the Spirit of God to awaken the hearts of students on campuses throughout our community... and the world!

See You at the Pole[™], the global day of student prayer, began in 1990 as a grass roots movement with ten students praying at their school. More than two decades later, millions around the world pray on their campuses on the fourth Wednesday in September.

SYATP is simply a prayer rally where students meet at the school flagpole before school to lift up their friends, families, teachers, school, and nation to God. SYATP is a student-initiated, student-organized, and student-led event.

One of the amazing aspects of See You at the Pole[™] is the spiritual harvest that continues on. After students rally together at their flagpole in September, Bible clubs, prayer groups, and evangelism takes place all year long. Many churches work together to sponsor before and after the Pole rallies for students.

Whether a single student standing alone, two or three huddled together in unity, or hundreds gathered in front of the school, See You at the Pole[™] is about students praying for awakening on campuses all over the world.

The 2012 See You at the Pole[™] theme is Awaken and the Scripture is Ephesians 3:14–21—"For this cause I bow my knees unto the Father... Water, Water...Nowhere, Please!

The Congregation Council in special meeting on August 26 has called a **Congregation Special Assembly** for **September 16, 2012 following the 10:30 service** for the single purpose of acting on its recommendation to accept the bid of Tiadaughton Contractors for the method of keeping water away from the basement wall of the Parish House and thus out of the basement.

Water entry has been a long-standing problem, and a headache for us and for our tenants, Little Lambs Preschool. After many discussions by the Property Committee in recent years, the Tiadaughton firm has devised a system which involves permanently closing the window wells, adding a slope of clay-type soil, covering this with a rubber membrane attached to the building and ending about six feet away from the building, and adding a water-

gathering pipe system at the edge of the membrane leading to the storm drain in the middle of the courtyard. Since the location is in the courtyard and not easily accessible to heavy machinery, there is lots of hand-work involved. The price of the contract is \$11,800, which the Property Committee judges to be reasonable given the scope of the project. An artist's drawing of the proposal is available in the office hallway. Thank you to all who walked and donated for the CROP Walk in 2011.


Last year's CROP Walk brought over thirty churches, synagogues, and organizations with donations totaling \$14,729.99. Thank you for doing your part in fighting hunger both locally and globally. 25% of the money we collect comes back to our community and is distributed equally to the American Rescue Workers Food Pantry, the Salvation Army Food Pantry, the United Churches Food Pantry and St. Anthony's Center.

The other 75% is distributed by Church World Service nationally and internationally to help people who are hungry. We have taken a local allocation for the past 14 years, which has brought a total of \$53,739.61 back into our community.



On Friday, November 30, and Saturday, December 1, 2012, Lutheran Shared Ministry (LSM) will present <u>A Christmas Carol</u>, dinner theatre style, in Fellowship Hall at St. Mark's Lutheran Church. All donations will go to UCM of Penn College.

On Sunday and Monday evenings, September 9 and 10, 2012, at 6:00 p.m., auditions and a volunteer sign-up will be held in the Nave at St. Mark's. Willing folk from all the congregations in LSM are welcome to audition and sign up to assist with meal preparation and service, scenic construction and painting, costumes, props and other technical needs.

The one-act play is adapted from Dickens's story to incorporate straight acting during the staves, interspersed with carolers. Those who are not comfortable singing are encouraged to audition for the character roles; parts are available for

four men, three women, five-six either/or, and 4-6 children. We hope to see a caroling group (not too large) from each congregation; singers and instrumentalists may also audition for some solo work. Health, Healing & Wholeness

"Anyone who listens to the word but does not do what it says is like a man who looks at his face in a mirror and, after looking at himself, goes away and immediately forgets what he looks like." (James 1:23-24 NIV)

It's maddening – embarrassing – but most times, completely normal. I'm referring to memory lapses – those times when you've walked into a room, and couldn't remember why you'd gone in it. Most frustrating for me is placing an important letter or paper in "a place where I won't forget it", only to have forgotten where I'd placed it. I've hidden gifts, and discovered on Christmas morning. Thank heaven for decorated gift bags!

If you are like me, and have put the peanut butter in the fridge and the milk in the cupboard, take heart! There are some important differences between forgetfulness and dementia (impaired memory and thinking). In dementia, memory loss is severe enough to interfere with the person's ability to function socially and at work. Other symptoms can include personality changes, impaired judgment, language, ability to perform a job that requires remembering several steps, or recognition of objects or people. In contrast, "normal" forgetfulness does not progressively worsen or become disabling. Memory lapses are most likely to occur when you are under stress, are tired, ill, distracted, or just trying to remember too many details.

Forgetfulness can also be linked to physical problems, such as:

- a reduction in blood flow to the brain caused by high blood pressure.
- those who suffer from sleep apnea (stop breathing temporarily many times during the night). Given memory tests, these folks score lower – scores usually rise after treatment.
- an under-active thyroid; can affect learning, memory and attention.
- low iron levels; important for our blood to carry oxygen throughout the body, including to the brain.
- cardiovascular disease, diabetes, depression, or the side effects of medications can also contribute.

And what may appear to be forgetfulness just might be attributed to poor hearing or vision.

Yes, it's true. It appears we really do lose some brain cells over a life-time. Researchers have found that a half to two-thirds of people age 50 or over have some degree of memory loss, however, they disagree over how much deterioration is "normal".

According to Harvard Medical School, "It's important to note, though, that memory loss isn't inevitable." To combat and sharpen your memory try reducing stress and improving your organizational skills. Regularly challenge your brain – play games, do crossword puzzles, word scrambles, play chess, or take some classes. Personally, I'd be lost without my daily planner. However, even though I've written something down, I still have to remember to read it ... ©


