The Word is always in season.

Here are the topics that we are working on together with Pastor Elkin right now.

- † The **First Communion class** has just concluded its three sessions. While together, we reviewed several major stories including the Passover, the Last Supper, Jesus feeding of the 5,000, Jesus eating with sinners. We discovered that God "makes a place for us" at his table. The students and parents worked on additional Bible stories together at home.
- † Catechetical students, parents, and mentors continue their monthly sessions. On alternating years we work on the patriarchal narratives in Genesis and Exodus, and the Gospel of Luke. Right now we're beginning the Joseph cycle in Genesis 36. In our last session, the parents viewed a video interpretation of the text in order to help them better work with their students on the home-questions for the next class.
- The **Sunday morning Crossways class** is now on Unit 6 of that intensive survey study of scripture initiated by Australian Lutheran pastor Dr. Harry Wendt. This group has recently explored the three parts of the covenant with Abraham and its continuing significance in scripture and life, and are moving now to see how that plays out in succeeding generations. There are lots of places at the table for others to join the study.
- † The **6:31 A.M. Thursday Men's Bible Study** has just concluded its work in the book of Genesis and this week turns to the book of Job. After reading a portion of scripture, we read and discuss the comments of the Orthodox pastor and scholar Fr. Patrick Henry Reardon, and close the time by singing a hymn.
- † The **Wednesday Noon Bible Study** is continuing its study of the Psalms, now up to Psalm 35. We begin with a hymn to set the theme for the day, read the Psalm and Fr. Reardon's comments and then explore the meaning of the Psalm through art, music, literature, and life. It is always a wide-ranging discussion.
- † Pastor Elkin also leads studies in joint ventures with other congregations such as the **Lay School** on Wednesday afternoons in October, and the **Catechetical Retreat Day** in January. Both events are held here at St. Mark's for all area Lutheran congregations to participate.

Of course there are other opportunities as well, with many additional leaders, for all ages, especially on Sunday morning. Just as the First Communion students discovered that Jesus makes a place for them at his Holy Table, there are also places for each person at the table of Bible-study as well. If one of the many existing ones does not fit your schedule, please ask, and we'll invent another one!

2013 Offering Envelope Alert




Beginning Sunday, December 1st, offering envelopes for 2014 will be available in the Narthex.



Special Canine Friends

Perhaps visitors to a nursing home or other facility have noticed a small or large dog wearing a neckerchief and badge accompanied by its owner walking around greeting those who might enjoy their company. The sniff and wagging tails always bring a smile to the faces of residents, staff, and visitors alike. The value of "pet therapy" has been shown again and again in reducing blood pressure, improving mood, and stirring interest in activities and surroundings.

Not just any dog can serve in this way. They have to be the right temperament and be trained in appropriate behavior. There is an organization which gives guidelines and then tests and insures dogs for pet therapy work, Therapy Dog International (TDI). With the permission of our Council, TDI has tested dogs on two occasions here at St. Mark's for service locally. The tests are rigorous and the process takes several hours. Not all of the dogs who apply will pass the test; some need more training, and others may never pass because of a temperament problem. Luncheon Fellowship attendees may remember the black dog Jessie who came with Jane Kline occasionally. This dog has now passed the test and is ready for service.




LSM 16th Annual Catechetical Retreat



There are tasks for many hands!

And yet another issue on the horizon!

A guest article from the pen of the Rev. Keith Eslinger of St. Timothy Lutheran Church, Camp Hill PA. He writes:

It has become increasingly popular these days for some churches to commune people who are not baptized. These are, for the most part, churches that might be termed "generic protestant", meaning that such a body defines their Church, or Christianity, or even all who believe something, to be basically on the same page—one happy family, so to speak. The problem with this is that any distinctiveness and sometimes the Christian faith—goes right out the window in an effort to seek the lowest common denominator. This is what some have called the faith of the "Great Pumpkin." It is an unshaped, indiscriminate, unthinking mess, which adapts itself to anything and everything as long as it conforms to the "radical inclusivity of the gospel". This is how the idea of communing the un-baptized came about.

From the beginning, the Christian tradition has communed only those who have first been baptized. In a 2nd Century writing, *The Didache*—accepted by nearly all Christians as formative for our tradition—in the section concerning the Eucharist, the following is clearly stated:

9:5 Allow no one to eat or drink of your Eucharist, unless they have been baptized in the name of the Lord. For concerning this, the Lord has said, "Do not give what is holy to dogs."

In the quote above, from the Gospel of Matthew 7:6, Jesus refers to the "dogs"; meaning in Scripture either gentiles (un-believing non-Jews), or the sexually immoral. Both are possible uses of the term. In any event, indiscriminate Communion of those who simply want it is prohibited. If they wish to be included in the Christian celebration of the Sacrament of the Altar, why not be examined and baptized first? What reason could they have for not being baptized, other than not wishing actually to be Christian? If a person believes, there is no reason not to baptize! (Acts 8:26-40 & Acts 16:25-34)

The rationale among those who worship the "Great Pumpkin" is that they wish to include everyone equally, making no distinction, citing the radical inclusivity of the gospel. Fine, but we already *do* that in admitting all people who have been instructed to the rite of baptism. For children under the age of consent, we teach the parents. Lutherans baptize infants, toddlers, young children, teens, and adults, of both genders, all races, and all nationalities, into the Christian Faith. We are already *completely inclusive* of those who truly wish to be Christian.

You might ask why we're talking about this topic. Simple answer: Because some pressure will likely come to us to do this. We may very well get children who have been admitted to Communion in other traditions but have not yet been baptized. It's important that we all know the basic Christian tradition we've received, especially since the ELCA is seriously beginning to consider the practice of un-baptized Communion, against all evidence of apostolic practice and teaching! [A task-force has been formed to report to the next national Assembly.]
