

Members of the Reconciliation panel may help to facilitate the Council discussions. When decisions about how best to proceed are reached, the congregation will be informed. Until that time, the Council asks the congregation's patience as the process moves deliberately and privately within the Council.

SUMMER FORUM BEGINNING!

Come to the Crossways Room for a wide variety of topics and conversation sparked by videos on Sunday mornings at 9:15 this summer.

Some of the topics are:

June 8 – on the day close to the 70th anniversary of D-Day, "*The Incredible Story of the Zamzam*" The true story of a ship-load of missionaries on their way to Africa that was attacked by a Nazi raider and sunk, miraculously without loss of life. Survivors who were children in 1941 tell the story.

June 15 – on Trinity Sunday, "Why so much talk about Baptism? What about faith?" with Pastor Steven McKinley, a Lutheran pastor in Minnesota.

Can You Dig It?

On May 1, Pastor Elkin went to the parochial school at Trinity Lutheran Church in Wellsboro where grandchildren Emma and Liam are students, and gave a presentation on archeology to the older students. The visit was prompted by the school recently presenting its spring musical entitled "Dig It", wherein the students sang about what an archeologist might find in India, Egypt, Greece, and Rome. Since they were obviously intrigued by the subject, Pastor Elkin offered to come and tell them from first-hand experience what working on an archeological dig is like.

To the gathered students in Grades 3-6, the Pastor showed photos and artifacts, talked about daily life on a dig, and demonstrated just how long Jericho has been a settled place.

There are 21 different cities built on top of each other at that site, dating back 11,000 years!

With a time-line on the scale of 6" = 100 years, the time-line to 9000BC reached around the room.

With the students in grades 5-6, Pastor constructed scale-models of a dig of a synagogue, which the students had to "dig" using spoons and then make a map of what they found. It taught them how careful one needs to be in doing this work, and meticulous in record-keeping.

The Pastor has received many thank-you notes.


The teacher began with "The children absolutely loved it. They are still talking about it. Your topic really clicked with them."

Here is a list of some of they things the students learned and wrote in their notes to the Pastor:

† People in B.C. times used oil lamps. If you

- were rich you might have fancy designs on your lamps; if you weren't wealthy you had plain lamps with no designs.
- † That there are21 cities on the tell at Jericho.
- † That you have to wake up long before the sun, so it is not so hot to work.
- † What a synagogue is.
- † I think that it is amazing that people actually made mosaics out of small pieces of stone. It would be a lot of work. They were unique, beautiful, and wonderful.
- † That high school and college students also worked at the dig.
- † I saw the kinds of tools that you used.
- † I learned what a roof roller is.
- † Thank you for teaching us what digs are actually like and it is not as Indiana Jones makes it look.
- † I learned that coins and gold and stuff like that are super rare.
- † I liked digging in the boxes.
- † Pottery does not decay fast, and can withstand being in the ground for hundreds of years.
- † Sifting is a boring job.
- † When you dig you have to work very carefully and not move anything.
- † Thanks for showing us your pictures and that humongous time line.
- † Thanks again for coming to our school and not staying home.



Illiterate?

One of our Anglican friends writes:

Christians are a people of the book—but I fear we've grown illiterate.

69% of adult Americans consider themselves Biblically literate according to <u>a study</u> conducted in 2013 by the Barna Group. But the same study found that 58% of American Christians are not interested in Biblical insight on how to live their lives.

Instead, the survey found that the highest-ranking topic about which we look to the Bible for wisdom was death. This disconnect between reading God's Word and believing that God's Word applies directly to our lives is troubling.

Further, many churches don't have Bible studies anymore. Instead, they may have community groups and Sunday school classes, in which they talk about feelings, but rarely open the Bible.

Even when they do attempt to study Scripture on Sunday mornings, they boil God's word into spiritual slogans like "God helps those who help themselves" (which is not in the Bible).

Even worse is the way Scripture is leaking out of many worship services. On any given Sunday morning in America, pastors stuff sermons with personal anecdotes to make the Scripture text interesting and "relevant." In our attempt to make worship approachable some have exchanged liturgy drawn from Scripture with extemporaneous speaking.

When a pastor was challenged on the number of personal anecdotes in his sermons, he said, "People need personal application. Without it, what's the point?"

What is the point? We've fooled ourselves into thinking we are a people of the book. Instead, we have become a people of words—but they are our words, made in our image, and if we're not careful our faith will be too.

What might it look like to take Biblical literacy seriously?

Care with words: To take Biblical literacy seriously means to see God's word as sacred and therefore different from every other word. It means allowing silence and music and carefully

chosen words to fill our worship, instead of just normal talk.

Preaching to the text rather than to the application. When we take Biblical literacy seriously we assert a belief in the work of the Holy Spirit. We believe that the Holy Spirit is active in our reading of God's word. Biblical literacy requires us to forgo our own understanding and to practice listening to God by way of the text. Our preaching needs to begin and end in the stories of Scripture rather than personal anecdotes. The Bible does not need to be made interesting, relevant, or applicable by salesmanship. It is the job of the Holy Spirit to apply God's word to our lives—not the other way around.

Learn how to read from our poets. Our modern impulse is to read quickly and efficiently. We like our lessons literal and our answers clear. Jesus taught in parables because they were an easy to remember in a non-literate society. Those parables are still powerful today, but Scripture does not fit into a single genre.

To take Biblical literacy seriously we must learn to read like poets, who are comfortable in evocative images. Further, a poem never has one meaning or a single application. A poem refuses to be winnowed down like that and when we learn to read like poets we will stop treating Scripture in this manner. We can begin to hear God's still, small voice from the whirlwind.

When we ignore the question of literacy we risk becoming unmoored from the reason we worship together in the first place. If we are Biblically illiterate then what is the point?

Jesus Christ is the point.

All our activity—the worship, service projects, committee meetings, and personal devotions — has a single purpose: to love the Lord our God with all our hearts, souls, and minds.

The truth is simple: we cannot be God's people unless we are a people of the Book.
