† **SPACE FOR WORSHIP** Although Christians may worship anywhere we usually have a specific place for worship. We'll discern some of the principles that stand behind the work of church architects, and explore by video some of the great worship spaces around the world. Along the way, we may discover ways in which our current worship spaces can function more effectively as proclaimers of the Gospel. † **"AND A LITTLE CHILD WILL LEAD THEM"** Have you ever wondered why Jesus played with children and taught adults, while we do just the opposite? Every once-in-a-while we have a chance to see things from Jesus' point of view, and over the next few weeks, we will do just that. This course will help us see the wisdom of children in ways that surprise the adults around them. Through a series of quiet, and often overlooked films, we will be taught a few things about ourselves and our world, seen through the eyes of children. Join us and see what we're talking about.

October 7 – MILLIONS The year is 1999, and the United Kingdom is about to join the European Union. When Damian's cardboard playhouse is hit by a suitcase filled with money, Damian is convinced he has received a gift from God. Damian is eager to share the wealth with those in need, but his older brother, Anthony, has other ideas, and their father is just befuddled. Find out what happens in this film that the Wall Street Journal called "Joyously Funny!" You won't be disappointed.

October 14 – PAPER CLIPS This is a true story about middle-school students in Whitby, Tennessee, who wanted to do something different to help them understand the Holocaust. What they did opened their eyes, made national headlines, and brought them international acclaim. When you see what they did, you won't forget it.

October 21 – AKEELAH AND THE BEE Akeelah Anderson acquired her love of words from her father, who was shot dead while walking home one night. As she tries to come to grips with her loss, she enters her school's spelling bee, which she wins. Still, it's a long way to Washington, DC, and the Scripps National Spelling Bee, but every journey has to start someplace. Take that first step with her, and you'll stay for the whole ride.

October 28 – BECAUSE OF WINN-DIXIE When Opal moves to a small Florida town with her preacher father, she's the 'new kid' who doesn't know anyone. She adopts a stray mutt, just to have a friend, and because of Winn-Dixie, life changes: for Opal, her father, and the misfits around them. USA Today called the film, "sweet, touching, and funny;" you'll likely form your own opinion, all because of Winn-Dixie.

† **PERICOPE STUDY** "Pericope" is a fancy term for the Bible passages chosen for the coming weeks. Join area pastors as they read the lessons, delve into the background of each lesson, and discuss together how best to get its message said clearly in this time and place. This is always a lively one-hour conversation, led by a different pastor each week.

Sunday, October 18, has been set as our congregation's Consecration Sunday. It is a wonderfully appropriate way to approach the everyday decisions of how we manage all of the resources that God has placed in our hands. I urge you to plan now to attend the two important events: (1) Sunday morning worship, and (2) one of the celebration meals, either the breakfast following the 8:00 service or the luncheon following the 10:30 service that same day. The meals will be held in Fellowship Hall, and they will be catered.

This spiritual-growth-oriented process is designed to enrich our biblical understanding of Christian stewardship. Rather than focusing on the need of the church to receive, the experience concentrates on the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development.

We believe that you are concerned enough to attend on Consecration Sunday and make your financial commitment as a portion of your worship of the Lord God Almighty on that day.

No one will call you at your home for pledges. But we will contact you personally to secure your commitment to attend morning worship on Consecration Sunday and the Celebration Breakfast or Luncheon to be held immediately after each service. Reservations may be made in person at Sunday worship on the two weeks prior, and by telephone to the church office.

Take in a live show featuring a great horned owl, Norway rat, scorpion, alligator, and rattlesnake!

You'll be amazed by the efficiency of most nocturnal animals. Snakes, for example, are among the most efficient nocturnal predators, even though they have poor eyesight. Their excellent sense of smell aids in detecting and tracking prey. Snakes smell with their tongue and some even have heat-sensing organs on either side of their heads to detect the distance and location of prey! This year we raised \$1,191.00 with an additional donation from Thrivent Financial of \$300.00. These funds will be distributed by the Women of St. Mark's in support of charities both locally and globally.

*“Ever hear of the Bucksgahuda and Western Railroad Co.? For many years, our own model train enthusiast **Frank Ulman** has been intimately involved in the preservation and development of this industrial railroad located in St. Mary’s, Pa. At one time, before forklifts and conveyors were invented, industrial railroads, made up of smaller-sized locomotives and rolling stock, were the backbone of many industries, including sawmills, coal mines, brickworks and construction sites. Each Sunday on the third Sunday of both August and September, the railroad is open to the public.*

Admission is free but donations are gratefully accepted. Much larger than the trains you ride at amusement parks, the locomotives and rail cars of the B & W provide a more authentic experience as you chug along the tracks through its picturesque wooded setting. There’s lots to see and do. You can tour the restored train station, stroll through the refurbished cabooses, or just settle back for a steam engine ride through the woods. Incidentally, Frank’s railroad interests don’t stop with the B & W- he has a delightful garden railroad in his own backyard!”

They finish in time to carry their offering into the Nave with the adults, then join their parents for the rest of the service. 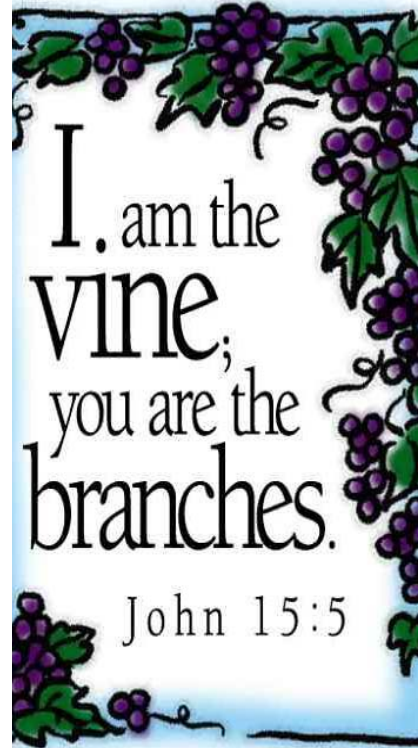

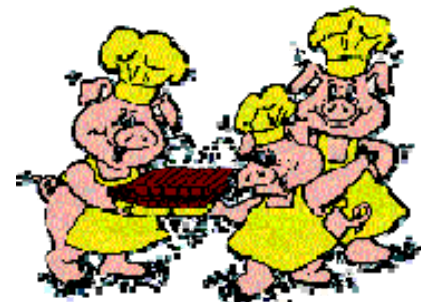
