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Dear Friends of St. Mark's Lutheran Church,

Grace to you and peace.

Last month I wrote about the not so easy Summer and our Lord's remedy for that, the Cross – that yoke that is easy to bear because the burden is light (see Matthew 11:29). This month, I want to focus the attention on the blinding light of the Transfiguration of Our Lord.

We celebrated Transfiguration the Sunday before Ash Wednesday. This year we will observe it twice. Our Roman Catholic brothers and sisters kept Transfiguration Day on August 6th. We observed the same date until around 1978. To highlight our similarities we will celebrate both together.

The second reason for observing Transfiguration Day is that the world was transfigured by a blinding light not that many years ago on August 6, 1945. We didn't see it, but those who did in Hiroshima were blinded and many incinerated by it. Since then we all live under the cloud of a

possible nuclear blast, thousands of times greater than that one.


To the point. God's way forward for us, is the way of the Cross and the Power of Forgiveness. Revenge and retribution are the ways of death and destruction. Consider then, in the remaining days of Summer, how God is using us to do the things that make for peace. It's been an uneasy

worldly peace since 1945. Pray to God for the Transfiguration of our lives for the life of the world.

You may choose to make Personal Care Kits, Layette Kits, or Fabric Kits. Soap Bars are also being collected.

All kits and soap bars are due by September 10th.

Put your faith into action!



School Kit

✓ 4 - 70-sheet notebooks of wide- or college-ruled paper approximately 8" X 10½" (no loose-leaf paper)

- 1 30-centimeter ruler, or with centimeters and inches
- ✓ 1 pencil sharpener
- 1 blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- 5 unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band
- 5 black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink); secure together with a rubber band
- ✓ 1 box of 16 or 24 crayons
- √ 12½" eraser
- 1 sturdy drawstring backpack-style cloth bag approximately 14" X 17" with shoulder straps (no standard backpacks)

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new & in good condition. Remove any excess packaging, pack all items in bag and close.

Personal Care Kit

- 1 light-weight bath-size towel (max. 52" X 27"), dark color
- 2 bath-size bars (4 to 5 oz.) of soap, any brand, wrapped
- 1 adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging
- [♥] 1 sturdy comb, remove packaging
- 1 metal nail clippers remove packaging

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new and in good condition. Wrap all the items in the towel and tie securely with ribbons or yarn.

Fabric Kit



- ✓ 2 pieces of cotton or cottonblend fabric (no knits or 100% polyester). Each piece should match one of the sizes below:
- \times ° 2½ yards of 60" wide fabric, or

Fabric should have no stains or holes. Pieces do not need to match in size or color/pattern. Fold thread and one piece of fabric inside second fabric piece and tie with yarn, sturdy string, ribbon or a strip of fabric.

Layette Kit



- ∂ 2 lightweight cotton tshirts
- ∂ 2 long- or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers (without feet)
- 2 receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn, up to 52" square
- 8 4 cloth diapers, flat fold preferred
- 3 1 jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, or include a baby cap
- 2 pairs of socks
- 2 bars of gentle soap (4-5 oz bars)
- ∂ 1 hand towel, dark color wrapped
- 2 diaper pins or large safety pins

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. Gently used, clean items (no stains or tears) or new. Wrap items in one of the receiving blankets and secure with diaper pins.

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

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Confirmation Camp Field Trips

During the week of July 10, our confirmation students visited the American Rescue Workers and Habitat for Humanities Restore.

At ARW, they learned about the part of the



organization that generates the most income for their operating expenses. Four of the floors of the familiar building located at the corner of High and Elmira Streets are dedicat-

ed to sorting, repairing, recycling, and distributing everything they collect from bazaars, yard sales, and other donations. At the same location is lodging for men who are temporarily without a home—many put in hours working on one of the floors above them. Meals are also served

there for those in need. Across the street, they operate a food pantry and provide monetary assistance for those in need.

While at the ReStore, Mabitat for Humanity they learned much about D that facility on the corner of Rose and Fourth Streets.



They also learned about what Habitat has accomplished in our community.

The income generated by the items sold at ReStore goes a long way to funding the Habitat builds in our area. There you will find doors, appliances, paint, furniture, fixtures, and more (one of our girls had her eye on a desk she would like for her room at home).

They saw and learned a lot at both places and the volunteers couldn't have been more helpful!

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TRANSFORM

"Transform is our local mission experience where we work on various homes and



projects for those in need in our community. This is a powerful time where we get to be a part of what God is doing through our neighborhoods, through the platform of mission work. This started as Transform Williamsport, and has grown to include various locations across the state. - ★ Hundreds of trinkets, necklaces and kiddle tattoos.

Our organist, Donna Zierdt Elkin, with assistance from several congregation members and other local performers, presented a patriotic program in our nave with more than 100 people enjoying the presentation and participating in singing along. Nick Buckman brought in sound equipment to broadcast the radio simulcast the entire evening including during the fireworks.

People donated \$469.48 to St. Anthony's Center. This is an all-time high!

The Outreach Committee heartily thanks the congregation for the many donations of candy, water, salty snacks, soda, hot dogs, buns and money to support this event. Extra special thanks go to the many members of the congregation who volunteered to set up, serve and clean up this event all in time for the fireworks.
