Join us on Wednesday, April 4, 2018 at 7 PM at Perkins on Via Bella (in the back room); come early to share a meal together or just arrive for coffee, dessert, and discussion. We will reflect on the studies and commemoration held in the past year and chart a path forward for continued local collaboration. All are welcome.

We concluded our 6-week joint Lutheran-Catholic study of From Conflict to Communion the first week of February at Perkins. Over those weeks, we gathered as a group ranging from 12-15 people (or just 6 on that icy/snowiest of days!) from 6 different local congregations. The discussions were open and engaging with plenty of personal experiences and stories shared. The fellowship was encouraging, and there was plenty of good food and good food for thought. We look forward to seeing many of you there on April 4th to continue to work together on our journey towards visible Christian unity as members of the body of Christ.

Grace to you and peace.

This Lenten season could very well be the best one I've ever experienced as a pastor. Last year's was probably my toughest and the two may be related. A year ago it was a matter of getting used to the number of services, their length, and shear amount of detail. This year it's as if all that discipline now results in a deep appreciation of getting to be with you again. There is a parallel, too, between the experience of that first Easter and our experience of experiencing, note the word "our", our last Easter together.

The first disciples had no idea of what was about to happen to Jesus. Even though Jesus had been bracing them for the trial and execution, they dismissed it as something that could or would never happen. Then when it happened, they couldn't begin to understand what resurrection was all about. We have the benefit of two thousand years of the accumulated wisdom of the saints who've lived and died in this faith. Yet even so, when it comes to our own death, well it's just unimaginable. All we know is life and the reality of dying and death around us, but not our own. This is the universal predicament of all people. This is also why this is why this Lent is "the best ever".

We know that in a little while, our work together will end. I will no longer be your "pastor for now". Due to the distances involved, we will not see each other again in this life. Thus, this Lent is a death as well as the beginning of something new that we can only imagine in part. For me, and I hope for you, our separation will be both sorrowful and joyous, both on a human and divine point of view. God sees it complete, from the foundation of the world, we, only in part, one day at a time.

For these reasons, these words from the Sunday liturgy take on deeper meaning as our work nears completion: "Therefore, gracious Father, with this bread and cup we remember the life our Lord offered for us. And, believing the witness of his resurrection, we await his coming in power to share with us the great and promised feast."

Likewise, wherever our life in Christ Jesus takes us, we will continue to be united in him in the communion of saints which is forever.

Pray for me, as I pray for you always in Christ Jesus.

Sat., Apr. 21, 2018 beginning at 10:00 am


Locally, 13.5% of our Lycoming County population struggles with food insecurity (feedingamerica.org.) You can easily help reduce this insecurity by participating in our meal packaging event. Our goal is to package 20,000 meals of pasta with tomato basil sauce to be distributed to local food banks and food pantries in the Greater Williamsport Area including The New Love Center in Jersey Shore and other sites in Lycoming and Clinton counties.

The Outreach Committee needs volunteers to set up, pack meals that day and clean up, donate funds to offset the cost of hosting this event and to donate food items for the refreshment stand.



MISSION IN LIBERIA

Sandy Nelson, St. Michael's, Quiggleville

For the past 10 years, I have been going to Liberia among those representing the Upper Susquehanna Synod (USS) in its relationship with the Lutheran Church in Liberia (LCL). This relationship with the Lutheran Church in our area has been in place for 158 years. The activities of my visits there have been varied. For several years, I was involved with teacher training. In 2007, I was involved in starting five literacy groups in villages near the Lutheran Training Institute (LTI). I continue to visit and encourage those groups. As times change, so do the purposes of our mission. The ELCA's purpose for mission is accompaniment—building relationships.

In 2016, I was the only person going from the USS and I felt we needed to make an effort to expose more of our people to the mission in Liberia. Hopefully, we can find someone who would fall in love with the mission as I have.

For the last two years, we have had four new visitors and two who had lived in Liberia in the 1980's returned. This exposure has shown the visitors over 200 miles of Liberia, between Monrovia and Zorzor. Along the way, we have visited churches, schools and hospitals. We met there with the pastors, the teachers, and the hospital personnel—as well as several families.

It's often hard for Americans to comprehend the differences between their third world culture and our current society. While Liberians are human **be**-ings, Americans are human **do**-ings—always involved in the process. I think of this during church there. At St. Peter's, there are 650+ literally shoved into the pews, as well as more standing outside. The service can last 3½ hours and includes singing, sermon, and, sometimes, communion and dancing. Yet, everyone marches/dances to the front with their offering, taking joy in the moment.

Why do I go? In 2006, my first year, as we drove at

night from the airport to Monrovia, I felt: I love this place—I want to come back. Since then, I have continued to build relationships with and learn about the people and their culture.

This year, I was there during the partners meeting. I was invited as a guest of the Liberians. Bishop Collins was our representative, as well as Dr. Andrea Walker of the ELCA. They were there for three days: I was there two months. The other partners in this mission are the Churches of Sweden, Denmark, and Germany. As I continue to go, I continue to grow in knowledge and understanding through new experiences, new people, and new relationships—while maintaining and building on the old.

SCHOLARSHIP The St. Paul Lutheran Church Scholarship Program was founded by the congregation of the

former St. Paul Lutheran Church in Williamsport, Pennsylvania. St. Paul, prior to its closing, established this special scholarship program to benefit Lutheran students in Lycoming County, Pennsylvania.

Eligible candidates must:

- \checkmark Be graduating seniors of a high school, or a high school graduate equivalent, located in Lycoming County, PA. Candidates may reapply in successive years for scholarships available from this program.
