By walking on a fall afternoon, you create awareness to these issues, raise funds and have fellowship with members of the St. Mark's congregation as well as other congregations.

25% of the funds we raise support local hunger agencies plus we impact families in more than 35 countries. CROP walks support self-help programs, assist after disasters and help address root causes of poverty by providing water systems and tools to grow the food they need.

Organ Trouble!

While we hope you've been enjoying the piano accompaniment the past few Sundays, It was not by choice that services went that way. The blower on the organ is broken, several companies have been in to look at it and the news is not good.

The condition of the organ blower is, unfortunately, dire and it will have to be replaced. This means that the organ will be out of commission for quite some time (approximately 4-6 months). The cost of the replacement is upwards of \$18000.

To help fund raise for the organ repairs, my friend Harry Claude Baum and I are planning on presenting a concert by the Williamsport Camerata of choral music by American composers, where free will donations to the organ fund can be made. The tentative date for the concert is Sunday, November 17, 6pm, in the nave of St. Mark's.

While the blower is being repaired, the plan is to move the chapel organ to the nave and amplify it further by equipment from Sides music store.

I wish I had better news to tell, but I'm doing my best to have the organ fixed as quickly and as cost effectively as possible. Thanks for your patience and understanding.
