

Annual Assembly News It's A New Day

The fellowship hall of Christ Episcopal Church, on Mulberry and East Fourth Streets, was filled with over 70 people celebrating their common faith and the good they have done in Lycoming County over the past year as United Churches of Lycoming County (UCLC) celebrated its 73rd anniversary over a delicious roast beef dinner.

President Lou Kolb was filled with gratitude as he reviewed the events of the year and the dedicated people who carry out these ministries.

Among the business of the evening we approved an updated constitution and bylaws that greatly simplified the structure. The 2020 budget was passed. And the 2020 Board of Directors and Officers were elected. One of the highlights of the evening is always the announcement of our Ecumenical Service Award honoree. This year it was Dr. Alexander Nesbitt, who was praised for "a lifelong compassion for those who are ill" and this compassion inspired him, at an early age, to get into the medical field, where he has worked to make a more

abundant life possible for everyone. He was honored for "helping to establish, develop and continue the Susquehanna-Shirati Palliative Care Partnership." He has lectured, written, and taught courses all around the area and the world to "educate medical professionals and the public about hospice, palliative care and (to give) a better understanding of end-of-life issues."

He has brought the ecumenical community together to address the unmet needs in our community especially as it relates to end of life issues. And he works with each of our families with amazing care and listening skills, teaching us to think about how we want to live our lives right up until our death, and how to talk to each other about our wishes.

Religious Declaration of Unprecedented Climate Change

Responding to the very serious climate threat, the 2019 Religious Declaration of Unprecedented Climate Emergency was issued by the National Religious Coalition on Creation Care (NRCCC).

This was the 20th year for the annual prayer breakfast and week of action for public advocacy event, composed by Catholic, Protestant, Evangelical, and Orthodox Christians, and Jews.

The Declaration clarifies two essential facts: (1) humanity has an extremely short window of time in which to avert irreversible climate chaos, and (2) religions around the world consider protecting God's Creation a moral and spiritual imperative. An increasing number of members realize we need to address climate change with the same focus, fervor and self-sacrifice as a nation does in mobilizing itself for defense against a common foe (in this case, atmospheric physics).

The Declaration reflects major policy recommendation statements from their related national faith groups.

DIAL -A -DEVOTION *

Mentors in Faith

Lutheran campus ministries provide students with a haven from the pressures of academia while helping them realize their callings in Christ.

At Clemson University in south Carolina, Lutheran Campus Ministry helps students understand that their studies intersect with their Christian identity. The ministry's mentoring program, called 2x2, connects students with faculty and members of University Lutheran Church wha are in similar fields. These small groups meet regularly to discuss how one's vocation can be discovered through one's studies.

Tom Birdsong, a Clemson senior majoring in computer engineering, said that being part of 2x2 has helped him understand his vocational discernment is an ongoing process and that there are many paths he could pursue.

"I felt strongly that whatever I ended up doing as a profession had to be in service in some capacity," he said. "I knew I wasn't going in to a pastor role, but I was trying to find out how I could apply my engineering skills to projects that would create community and foster faith. Having the perspective of my mentors as people in academia and in my industry helped me realize there are a lot of that we can apply our vocation and do God's work at a community level."

Chris Heavner, campus minister at Lutheran Campus Ministry-Clemson, thinks the 2x2 program gives students a community of support. "Our mentors are able to take students on field trips and immerse them in experiences they wouldn't always be able to have," he said. Mission Support from the South Carolina Synod and the church-wide organization enhances the work of Lutheran Campus Ministry-Clemson.


