Dear Members and Friends of St. Mark's,

On Wednesday, February 26 the church begins a new season, Lent.



Lent is a season of the Church Year commemorating Jesus' 40 Days in the wilderness following his baptism; the time that scripture tells us he was tempted by the devil. When I was a child I was always a bit overwhelmed by the temptation of Jesus. I literally thought he spent 40 whole days and forty whole nights in the wilderness. I realize now that 40 could mean scripture's way of indicating this was an extended period of time. The actual amount of time doesn't really matter. What's important is to know that Jesus' temptation was of a very long duration.

In the story of Jesus' temptation (Matthew 4:1-11) the devil does a very good job tempting Jesus to forgo his mission and ministry. I mean, Jesus could have ruled the world—isn't that one of the reasons why he came? Of course there is just one small detail—you have to worship the devil. Ah, of course we know how Jesus will react. It's like a movie we've seen over and over again. We know how this will end. The devil finally gives up; he knows he hasn't got a chance.

That's the purpose to observing the season of Lent. We need to hear the Spirit's call to repent, to turn back to God, so that we are reminded that in the end the devil, sin, evil and death do not have the last word. The call of Lent is to proclaim that though we are tempted to turn from God and though sometimes we give in to those temptations, God stands ready to forgive. Because of what Jesus did in the wilderness, at the cross and unto death, victory for us is always assured.

The promise of resurrection is never far away. When Lent is finished, so is death! Thanks be to God who gives us the victory through Jesus Christ our Lord.

TOP TEN THINGS YOU CAN TRY FOR A MORE MEANIGFUL LENT:

Suggestions from "The Upper Room"

10. Try an electronic fast. Give up TV, Facebook, texting, tweeting, e-mail and all things electronic for one day every week. Use the time to read, pray and learn about fasting.

- **9. Start a prayer rhythm.** Each day of Lent, pray for another person.
- 8. Go deeper. Commit to a reading a chapter of scripture everyday as a part of your Lenten discipline.
- 7. Forgive someone who doesn't deserve it. Ask God for a deeper understanding of grace.
- **6.** Give up soft drinks, fast food, tea or coffee. Give the money you save to help folks in a different part of the world who are in crisis.
- **5.** Create a daily quiet time. Spend 10 minutes a day in silence and prayer. See how it can help you add spiritual practice to your daily life beyond Lent.
- **4.** Cultivate a life of gratitude. Write someone a thank you letter each week and be aware of how many people have helped you along the way.
- **3. Spend time in visual meditation and prayer**. Imagine you are part of your favorite bible story.
- **2. Volunteer** one hour or more each week with a local shelter, tutoring program, nursing home, prison ministry.
- **1. Pray for others** you see as you walk to and from classes or drive to and from work.

Remember, to participate in Lent is to better prepare for Easter. When Lent is looked upon as preparatory, our Easter celebration can and does take on greater meaning and Christ truly becomes the One who brings us forgiveness and life eternal.

Let us pray for a blessed and meaningful Lent that leads to a joyous Easter







POVERTY: A FAITH-BASED RESPONSE

Christian Social Concerns Committee

On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. -Mt 2:11. Epiphany holds rich significance for Christians. May we have a deeper "ah-ha" moment regarding what we will do, as we start a new decade, in charity and in justice for those experiencing hunger and poverty in our communities and the world. What talents and other gifts will we bring?

Resolutions for the New Decade: We Can End Hunger by 2030 - The United States and the world have made substantial progress against hunger and poverty over the past 50 years. But too many people, including Americans, are still being left behind. Ending hunger and poverty in our state and country requires political will as well as comprehensive solutions that enable people to move toward financial stability. Elected officials should:

- Support adequate federal funding for programs that help low-income communities. Anti-hunger programs such as SNAP and WIC help families deal with a job loss or crisis. Efforts to reform Medicaid should ensure that vulnerable families do not lose health care access.
- Support strong foundations for families, individuals, and workers. Ensuring that everyone has access to good jobs, a livable wage, and strong benefits lays a strong foundation for our workers. In addition, having access to quality education, affordable housing, health care, and asset and credit building opportunities empowers families and individuals to become financially independent.
- Support fair and equitable tax policy. Tax reform legislation should strengthen and expand earned income tax credits and child tax credits, narrow the widening inequality between top and bottom earners. Tax policies should prioritize low-income workers so they can earn more, save more, and build assets for the future. Legislation should not increase taxes for low-income work-
- Support comprehensive immigration policy. Immigration is a hunger issue on both sides of the border. Reform should both address the push factors that lead people to migrate from their home countries and, for those already here, prioritize family unity, human dignity, work opportunities, and responsible pathways to U.S. citizenship.
- Support a fair and equitable criminal justice system. Mass incarceration perpetuates hunger and poverty. Sentencing reform and support for individuals returning from incarceration, e.g., jobs, affordable housing, and programs such as TANF (Temporary Assistance for Needy Families) and SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program), will lower recidivism as well as hunger and poverty. FEBRUARY COMMEMORATIONS

Sunday, February 2, 2020 Presentation of Our Lord

Forty days after the birth of Jesus we mark the day Mary and Joseph presented him in the temple in accordance with Jewish law. There they were greeted by Simeon, an aged priest who offered the song "Lord, now you let your servant depart in peace," as well as by the prophet Anna, who spoke of the redemption of Israel.



Monday, February 3, 2020 Ansgar, Bishop of Hamburg, missionary to Denmark and Sweden, died 865 A monk who helped bring Christianity to Scandinavia, Ansgar returned to Germany where he was named bishop of Hamburg. He is remembered for his love for poor people.

Wednesday, February 5, 2020 The Martyrs of Japan, died 1597 Christianity was brought to Japan in the sixteenth century by Jesuit and Franciscan missionaries. The religion was suppressed, however, and in 1597 twenty-six missionaries and converts were crucified. Nevertheless, Christianity survived and later prospered.

Friday, February 14, 2020 Cyril, monk, died 869; Methodius, bishop, died 885; missionaries to the Slavs These two brothers from Thessalonika, Greece, were monks and were sent to bring Christianity to the Slavic people. In the course of their work they created a written language, inventing the Cyrillic alphabet for it, and translated the Bible and the liturgy.

Tuesday, February 18, 2020 Martin Luther, renewer of the church, died 1546 Though he began his adult church life as a simple Augustinian monk, Luther challenged the abuses he saw in the church, and his work eventually led to the Protestant Reformation. Luther's accomplishments included liturgical reform, translation of the Bible, and creation of the Small and Large Catechisms.

Sunday, February 23, 2020 Polycarp, Bishop of Smyrna, martyr, died 156 Because he is said to have been known by John, the author of Revelation, as well as the important early church fathers Irenaeus and Ignatius, Polycarp serves as a vital link in church history. He was burned at the stake at age 86 for refusing to renounce his faith.

Tuesday, February 25, 2020 Elizabeth Fedde, deaconess, died 1921 Born in Norway and trained there as a deaconess, Fedde was asked to come and minister to the poor and to seamen in New York City. She established the Deaconess House in Brooklyn as well as Deaconess Hospital in Minneapolis.


